TOPIC

Amendment to the Dyncorp service contract, valid July 1, 2016-June 30, 2019, for the maintenance of the District's Bell UH-1H helicopters.

SUMMARY

Under the contract, the contractor, DynCorp International, LLC, will provide the necessary personnel to maintain the District's Bell UH-1H helicopters. Metro Fire personnel will monitor the contractor's performance and service provided. The majority of maintenance work is performed at Station 115.

DISCUSSION

The amendment to the current contract changes the language from one mechanic to two mechanics, both at the journeyman level. The amendment also adjusts the pay scale to reflect the annual 3% increase, as noted in the current contract.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no change to the FY2018-19 budget. Metro Fire originally budgeted for a contract employee; however, the contract was not renewed, so the Dyncorp service contract has been amended to allow for an additional mechanic to fill the gap. The funds for the contract employee were transferred to the Dyncorp service budget line.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Board of Directors approve the amendment to the aircraft support contract with DynCorp International, LLC.

AMENDMENT TO SMFD AIRCRAFT SUPPORT CONTRACT

This is an amendment to the SMFD Aircraft Support Contract dated July 1, 2016, by and between Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District (SMFD), a Special District organized and existing under the laws of the State of California (customer) and Dyna Corp International LLC (hereinafter referred to either as DI and/or contractor).

- A. SMFD and DI entered into a contract for aircraft maintenance, T&M Contract Number SMFD-DYN-002, effective July 1, 2016.
- B. The contract specified the terms and conditions for aircraft maintenance, service and repair of two UH1H helicopters.
- C. The contract, which included Exhibits A, B, & C which were made part of the contract, provided in Exhibit A, paragraph 2, in pertinent part, that no variation or amendment of the terms of the contract are valid unless made in writing, signed by the parties and approved as required.
- D. The parties now desire to amend the agreement as follows:
 - 1. Paragraph 1.4 is changed as follows:

1.4 Approximate Workforce Size

This contract requires approximately two (2) employees. The current estimate includes a Lead FAA Certified Airframe & Powerplant Technician and a Journeyman FAA Certified Airframe and Powerplant Technician. Customer will determine the exact number and qualifications of contractor employees based on its actual needs.

Any Airframe and Power-plant ("A&P") technician assigned to maintain customer's aircraft shall have at least five (5) years of helicopter experience with not less than one (1) year of experience with the UH-1H helicopter.

- 2. Paragraph 1.6 is changed to state as follows:
 - 1.6 Customer reserves the right to purchase parts and contract for services from outside sources as detailed in Section 1.1.1. DI shall not be held responsible or liable for any work or services obtained outside of this contract.
- 3. Paragraph 1.7 is changed to state as follows:

1.7 Aircraft Maintenance

Contractor shall perform inspections, maintenance, repair, overhaul, alterations and modifications of Customer aircraft as specified in Section 2.0.

4. Paragraph 2.3 is changed to state as follows:

2.3 Maintenance Personnel Duties and Responsibilities

FAA Certificated Airframe & Powerplant Lead Maintenance Technician

Definition: This is the first supervisory level in the aviation maintenance program. Incumbents at this level are working supervisors, plan the daily workflow, coordinate the documentation of the maintenance and repair of aircraft, recover damaged aircraft and coordinate the flow of spare and repair parts.

Minimum Qualifications: Possession of the following certificates: FAA Airframe and Power-plant Technician's certificate and a valid class C California driver's license and five (5) years of work experience as a Journeyman level certificated A&P technician performing inspections and maintenance on UH-1H type specific aircraft (in addition to five years of work at the entry level, military experience may qualify for the five year entry level requirement if the level of work and responsibility was equal to that of a certificated A&P technician). Customer may waive FAA Inspection Authorization if it determines that the proposed lead technician has extensive equivalent military experience.

Knowledge and Abilities: FAA regulations pertaining to the maintenance, modification, and repair of the UH-1H aircraft, engines, and related systems; FAA-approved Maintenance and Inspection procedures, manuals, techniques, and procedures; aircraft shop maintenance organization, workload assessment, and assignment; and aircraft structures, systems, controls, engines, and components. Organize and lead a group of aviation maintenance technicians in the scheduled maintenance of UH-1H specific components and systems on the aircraft that the lead technician will be assigned to organize and lead a group of technicians in the emergency repair and recovery of damaged aircraft; inspect aircraft and systems for condition and continued flight readiness; return aircraft to service after major modification, maintenance and repair; maintain aircraft work order packages and compile all necessary documentation on the maintenance of aircraft; track technician work hours and track the shop hours involved in the various levels of maintenance. Extensive knowledge of FAA approved Maintenance and Inspection systems and procedures.

FAA Certificated Airframe & Powerplant Journeyman Maintenance Technician

Definition: This is the journey working level for certificated Airframe & Powerplant Technicians. Incumbents at this level work independently and inspect and repair aircraft, engines, components and systems and assess for damage, condition and method of repair, and may work off site at outlying field locations

Minimum Qualifications: Possession of the following certificates: FAA Airframe and Powerplant (A&P) Technician's certificate and a valid class C California driver's license (or comparable from another state). In addition, the Journey Technician must have five (5) years of work experience as a certificated A&P Technician performing inspections and maintenance on UH-1H or similar aircraft type. Military experience may qualify for the five-year work experience requirement if the level of work and responsibility was equal to that of a certificated A&P technician. Customer may wave five-year work experience requirement if it determines the proposed Journey Technician has extensive military or industry experience.

Knowledge and Abilities: FAA federal aviation regulations pertaining to the maintenance and repair of aircraft; FAA-approved maintenance practices, techniques, and procedures; aircraft shop maintenance operational procedures and fleet aircraft structure, systems, controls, engines and components. Work independently in a central aviation maintenance facility or work unsupervised off site at outlying field locations; perform depot level and field maintenance to aircraft, engines, propellers, rotors, components and systems in accordance with approved procedures; have a thorough working knowledge of all fleet aircraft, engines, and airframe systems; and ability to inspect and determine problems and correct deficiencies, inspect aircraft and systems for continued airworthiness, and return aircraft to service after major and minor maintenance and repair.

5. Paragraph Exhibit C shall state as follows:



TOPIC

Staff requests the Board of Director's approval to award a nonexclusive contract for janitorial services to Universal Building Services and Lincoln Training Center.

SUMMARY

The Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District's (Metro Fire) Purchasing Division requested proposals from qualified and experienced vendors to provide the highest level of janitorial cleaning and maintenance services for the following locations:

Metro Fire Headquarters, 1st and 2nd Floors Metro Fire Logistics Division Sacramento County Sheriff's Department Metro Fire Communications Division Metro Fire Fleet Division

10545 Armstrong Ave., Mather, CA 3012 Gold Canal Dr., Rancho Cordova, CA 2101 Hurley Way, Sacramento, CA

4427 Dudley Blvd., McClellan Park, CA 4425 Dudley Blvd, McClellan Park, CA

The request for proposal (RFP) was publically posted on publicpurchase.com on November 27, 2018. Interested firms were required to attend a mandatory pre-submittal job-walk on December 6, 2018. Any firms with late attendees or firms with attendees that did not attend the job-walk in its entirety were not permitted to submit a proposal. 13 janitorial firms attended the job-walk. Of these 13 firms, 10 were eligible to submit proposals as three of the firms' representatives did not attend the complete job-walk.

Purchasing received eight proposals from interested firms, however, one proposal was returned to the firm unopened as they did not have a representative present at the mandatory job-walk. The proposals received from the other seven firms were eligible for consideration. All proposers acknowledged that they will meet any and all Displaced Janitor Opportunity Act requirements contained in the California Labor Code, Sections 1060-1065. Additionally, it was verified that all proposers were registered with the Labor Commissioner's Office as janitorial service providers as required by the Property Services Workers Protection Act.

DISCUSSION

Proposals were evaluated based upon each firm's demonstrated success, staffing, cost of service, methodology, references, and response completeness. Out of 100 possible points, Universal Building Services and Lincoln Training Center received the highest scores, both receiving scores above 80 points. The third highest scoring firm was over 12 points lower than the firm with the second highest score.

Aside from receiving the highest overall scores, both Universal Building Services and Lincoln Training Center expressed value in providing their staff with required training sessions on topics specific to their staff's welfare. Some of the training topics included sexual harassment, anti-bullying, injury and illness prevention, and active shooter incidents.

As this is a nonexclusive contract, Purchasing is recommending Universal Building Services receive a contract award to provide janitorial services for the Metro Fire Headquarters and the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department locations in addition to Lincoln Training Center receiving a contract award to provide janitorial services for the Metro Fire Logistics, Communications, and Fleet locations. Both firms submitted exceptional proposals. Of these two firms, Universal Building Services provided lower pricing for services at the Headquarters and Sheriff's Department locations, while Lincoln Training Center provided lower pricing for services provided at the Metro Fire Logistics, Communications, and Fleet locations.

Contracts will be in effect for three years from the date of agreement with the option to extend for two additional one year contract terms.

FISCAL IMPACT

The following table outlines Metro Fire's current monthly janitorial costs:

The following table outlines the predicted monthly costs for services provided by Universal Building Services and Lincoln Training Center. Costs <u>include</u> all custodial supplies. Please note, the 1st floor of the Metro Fire Headquarters building was previously vacant and has recently been occupied by UC Davis. The cost of service for the Metro Fire Headquarters building will now include janitorial services for the 1st floor in addition to a mid-day porter five times per week at the request of the new tenant. The table above does not include these additional services.



The cost of service will result in an increase of approximately \$4,690 per month; an increase of \$168,840 over the life of a three year contract.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Board approve a nonexclusive contract award to Universal Building Services for the provision of janitorial services at the Metro Fire Headquarters and Sacramento County Sheriff's Department locations as described in the Summary above. Additionally, staff recommends that the Board approve a nonexclusive contract award to Lincoln Training Center for the provision of janitorial services at the Metro Fire Logistics, Communications, and Fleet locations as described in the Summary above. The contract will be in effect for three years from the date of agreement with the option to extend for two additional one year contract terms.

FY 2018/19 Mid-Year Budget Adjustments

OVERVIEW

The District utilizes an ongoing budget review process that includes a monthly comparison of budgeted and actual results at the divisional level and a quarterly review of District-wide revenues and expenditures by Command Staff and all budget officers. This collaborative review process allows for continual budget refinement based on the availability of new information, including actual spending and revenues, revised project schedules, and new program developments. The recommended FY 2018/19 Mid-Year Budget adjustments were developed as a result of this review process, and are based on actual spending and revenues through December 31, 2018 and projections for the remainder of the fiscal year.

As described in more detail below, the recommended Mid-Year Budget adjustments are relatively minor and continue to result in an essentially balanced General Fund budget, with revenues of \$205 million, expenses of \$206 million, and net transfers in of \$1 million.

DISCUSSION

General Fund Revenues

FY 2018/19 General Fund revenues are projected to be \$1.9 million higher than currently budgeted, for a total of \$204.8 million. Recommended mid-year adjustments to revenues include:

- <u>Deployments</u>: Additional deployment revenue for FY 2018/19 of \$1.1 million is included as a mid-year adjustment. This revenue is partially offset by an \$825,000 adjustment to the labor budget for deployment expenditures.
- <u>Property Taxes</u>: Based on revenues received so far this fiscal year, additional property tax revenues of \$365,000 are included as a mid-year adjustment.

General Fund Expenditures

Mid-Year Budget adjustments to General Fund expenditures result in a \$1.8 million overall increase, for a total expenditure budget of \$206.1 million.

Labor

Adjustments to the labor budget total approximately \$1.2 million in additional expenditures, for a total labor budget of \$174.8 million. Recommended mid-year adjustments to labor include:

- As identified in the revenue adjustments, deployments account for an additional \$825,000 of labor expenditure.
- An increase of \$430,000 is included for the staffing of flex medics effective January 2019.
- Although the overall impact to the labor budget is minimal, salary and benefits savings associated with position vacancies and leave cash outs (\$6.2 million) are expected to be almost entirely offset by increased callback overtime costs (\$6.1 million).

For purposes of the County's budget control procedures, an adjustment of \$1.4 million related to payments that will be issued in settlement of a Fair Labor Standards Act lawsuit is included on the attached General Fund budget resolution. Because this expense was already recognized in the District's FY 2017/18 financial statements, it is not otherwise reflected in the FY 2018/19 recommended budget.

Services and Supplies

The Mid-Year Budget adjustment for the General Fund services and supplies budget is an increase of approximately \$600,000, for a total of \$27.8 million. Recommended services and supplies adjustments include increased costs for the repair of District vehicles (partially offset by insurance proceeds), increased fuels costs, and various other adjustments.

Other Changes

An overall net increase of approximately \$500,000 in required transfers out of the General Fund results from the following:

- A net reduction in debt service in the Capital Facilities Fund of approximately \$400,000 due primarily to the timing of capital lease financing
- A net increase in capital outlay in the Capital Facilities Fund of approximately \$500,000 due to added equipment purchases and increased costs, partially offset by an increase in financing proceeds of \$300,000
- A reduction in proceeds from sale of assets of \$500,000 based on lower expected proceeds from the sale of District property

 A reduction in rental income in the Leased Properties Fund of \$300,000, partially offset by a reduction in services and supplies expenses of \$100,000.

An increase in transfers in to the General Fund from the IGT Fund of \$500,000 resulting from additional payments received during FY 2017/18 offsets the increases in transfers out of the General Fund.

General Fund Summary

With the proposed Mid-Year adjustments, budgeted General Fund revenues would be \$205 million compared to expenditures of \$206 million. Transfers in to the General Fund (from the IGT Fund) would exceed transfers out of the General Fund (to the Capital Facilities, Grants, and Leased Properties Funds) by approximately \$1 million, for an overall balanced General Fund budget.

Other Funds

Mid-Year Budget adjustments for the Capital Facilities Fund, Grants Fund, Development Impact Fees Fund, Leased Properties Fund, and IGT Fund are included in the attachments. Other than the changes to the Capital Facilities, Leased Properties, and IGT Funds discussed above, the recommended adjustments do not substantially change the net results for those funds.

RECOMMENDATION

Management recommends adopting the Mid-Year Budget adjustments for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2019.
