Chief Harms began his report reiterating that Labor and Management are continuing to work on District staffing as service delivery is and will continue to be Metro Fire's number one priority. The goal is to be proactive with staffing our stations.

OPERATIONS REPORT

Deputy Chef Mitchell relayed that the EMS Division completed their training program for the July protocol updates and assigned them to all line personnel for completion as continuing education.

Chief Mitchell highlighted several crew commendations received by local hospitals in the last few weeks' time including Firefighters Danny Kim & Dillon Fader who were honored by Kaiser North on May 18th for their efforts in transferring a fallen officer to UC Davis Medical Center. UCD also presented a case at the SCEMSA Stroke Care Committee meeting on May 18th where Firefighters Zakaree Cornell & Peter Jacquez were recognized for their patient care in providing a timely stroke alert on a 78 year old patient with left sided deficits. The patient was

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taken to interventional radiology and had no residual deficits after rehab. Also, Mercy San Juan Medical Center recognized Firefighters Kurt Steever & Aleksey Shakh for intervening and assisting nurses in the ER with a patient who became combative. They successfully deescalated the situation, and the nurses were appreciative of the intervention.

Chief Mitchell explained that the Training Division has been performing safety PPE cleaning extractor processes due to 12 sets of turnouts being contaminated with oil, gas and battery acid after a commercial fire in the city. Due to our internal process we were able to remove all the contamination and save these sets of turnouts. Our cleaning process of PPE has been recognized by several vendors as the model for other agencies to mirror. Chief Mitchell thanked Safety Specialists Bobby Sestito and Brian Spence and the Logistics team for their work.

The Battalion Chief Academy was held May 17^{th} - 21^{st} and proved to be a very successful week to help candidates prepare for the position. The Battalion Chief Promotional Exam will be held June $1^{st} - 4^{th}$.

Chief Mitchell also reported that since the last report out on May 13th, there have been 3,944 total calls for service with 18 building fires, 9 of which were Metro specific. The busiest engine was Engine 53 with 222 responses and the busiest medic was Medic 53 with 186 responses.

Chief Mitchell echoed the sentiments of Chief Harms, and discussed that through joint labor/management agreement, the new staffing procedures were implemented yesterday, May 26th to ensure consistency for how we staff apparatus.

3. GENERAL COUNSEL REPORT

General Counsel Lavra discussed the current status of our board meetings being held remotely, and the possible changes to this if the Emergency Executive Order issued by California Governor Gavin Newsom on March 4, 2020 were to be rescinded. During the public health emergency, this Executive Order was put in place to allow for adherence to social distancing requirements by suspending and waiving the teleconference requirements previously set forth in the Brown Act. With the news that the color coded tier requirements may be eliminated as of June 15th, if the Executive Order were to also be rescinded, we would revert back to the previous teleconference requirements set forth in the Brown Act and would likely begin to meet again in person.

General Counsel Lavra also explained that this would not be the case if any of the following occurred; Sacramento County issued an order that stipulated we must continue to adhere to social distancing requirements, the State and/or Governor extended the Emergency Executive Order, or one of two Assembly Bills currently in the legislature were voted into law and revised the Brown Act to allow for teleconferencing without the previous requirements.

Being that we do not know for sure exactly what the State of California or County of Sacramento will decide, General Counsel Lavra relayed that he will keep apprised of this situation and bring any new information to the Board as it becomes available.

SMFD – FIREFIGHTERS LOCAL 522 REPORT:

Vice President McGoldrick relayed that they are in the planning stages for a Fire Operations 101 course in October where elected officials are invited out to assist in performing field operations. Save the dates for this will be sent out shortly. VP McGoldrick then spoke about a golf tournament the Firefighters Burn Institute is hosting on June 7th, and relayed that though it is May 27, 2021 Board Meeting Action Summary Minutes

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sold out, raffle tickets for the event are still available. VP McGoldrick also recognized the membership who have stepped up during these unprecedented times and thanked the Board for their support and willingness to adapt to the changing environment.

TOPIC

Award an agreement for professional consulting services to Integrated Communications Strategies, LLC (Contractor).

DISCUSSION

The District has worked extensively with Contractor since September 2010 on a vast array of public education and communication issues/projects. As the District would incur increased costs to familiarize a new contractor with its matters, it is in the District's best interest to continue to procure the services from the Contractor to provide the following scope of services: shall perform communication and public affairs services to assist District in performing its duties as a major metropolitan fire district.

FISCAL IMPACT

The estimated cost for professional consulting services for the period of July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022, is estimated at \$5,000 per month, not to exceed \$80,000, and is fully accounted for in the FY 2021/22 budget.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board authorize the Fire Chief to enter into a one-year agreement with Contractor for professional consulting services as outlined in the agreement.

ENGAGEMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN SACRAMENTO METROPOLITAN FIRE DISTRICT AND INTEGRATED COMMUNICATIONS STRATEGIES, LLC

THIS ENGAGEMENT AGREEMENT ("Agreement"), made and entered into as of June 30, 2021, between Integrated Communications Strategies, LLC, with offices located at 2100 21st Street, Sacramento, CA 95818 ("Contractor"), and Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District, with its principal place of business at 10545 Armstrong Avenue, Suite 200, Mather, CA 95655 ("Client") sets forth the parties' understanding pursuant to which Contractor shall be engaged by Client.

Article 1. Services to be Performed by Contractor

- 1.1 <u>Services.</u> Contractor shall perform communication and public affairs services to assist Client in performing its duties as a major metropolitan fire district.
- 1.2 <u>Employment of Assistants.</u> Contractor may, at its own expense, employ such assistants as Contractor deems necessary to perform the services required of Contractor by this Agreement.

Article 2. Compensation

- 2.1 <u>Compensation.</u> Client shall pay Contractor a monthly fee of \$5,000 at the beginning of each month, starting on July 1, 2021. Should the amount of billed time exceed this retainer fee, Contractor may bill for services rendered above the fee amount so long as the total amount billed for the 12-month period does not exceed \$80,000. Unless otherwise terminated as provided in Article 4, this Agreement shall continue in force until the services provided for herein have been fully and completely performed through June 30, 2022. Attached is Contractor's rate sheet.
- 2.2 <u>Reimbursement for Expenses.</u> Client shall reimburse Contractor for actual, reasonable out-of-pocket expenses ("OOPs") incurred in Contractor's performance of this Agreement, including, but not limited to, expenses for delivery services, external printing, filing fees, pay-for-use databases, travel outside of the Sacramento region, and parking.
- 2.3 <u>Payment and Submission of Invoices</u>. Contractor will submit invoices to Client for the monthly retainer fee in advance of each month and for OOPs after they have been incurred with original back-up receipts. Contractor shall receive payment for the monthly retainer and OOPs within thirty (30) days upon receipt of the invoice.

2.4 <u>Termination of Services.</u> If Client terminates this Agreement, Client will compensate Contractor in accordance with its terms and provisions, including Article 4.1 for its services through the date of cancellation or discontinuance of services, and will indemnify Contractor as provided in Article 5.1.

Article 3. Obligations of Contractor

- 3.1 <u>Tools and Instrumentalities.</u> Contractor will supply all tools and instrumentalities required to perform the services under this Agreement.
- 3.2 <u>Confidentiality.</u> Contractor will use its commercially reasonable best efforts to safeguard the confidentiality of all proprietary and other confidential information and materials provided by Client. Contractor will not, without the express permission of Client, disseminate any such information or otherwise disclose to any outside party the content or substance of any communications, materials, or information prepared by Contractor in connection with this Agreement, except as required by law.
- 3.3 <u>Assignment.</u> Neither this Agreement nor any duties or obligations under this Agreement may be assigned by Contractor without the prior written consent of Client.
- 3.4 <u>Changes or Modifications.</u> Contractor may not change or modify the terms of this Agreement without the prior written consent of Client.

Article 4. Termination of Agreement

4.1 Termination, Cancellation or Discontinuance of Services Upon Notice. Either party has the right to terminate this Agreement at any time by giving thirty (30) days' written notice to the other party. Upon written notice, Client will also have the right to cancel or stop any and all plans, schedules or work in progress under this Agreement; and, in such event, Contractor will promptly take proper steps to carry out such instructions. In the case of termination of services, Client shall (i) pay Contractor, in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Agreement, any and all proper fees or charges earned and incurred by Contractor in connection with such work up to the time of its cancellation or discontinuance; and (ii) indemnify Contractor for all claims and actions by third parties for damages in consequence of Contractor's carrying out Client's instructions, except for claims or actions that result from Contractor's negligence or willful misconduct or that of its employees.

Page Three

4.2 <u>Termination on Occurrence of Stated Events.</u> This Agreement shall terminate automatically on the occurrence of (i) bankruptcy or insolvency of Contractor; (ii) sale of the business of Contractor; or (iii) assignment of this Agreement by Contractor without the express written consent of Client.

Article 5. General Provisions

- General Indemnification. Client will indemnify Contractor and its present or former employees against any loss or expense (including attorneys' fees) which they may incur as the result of any claim, suit or proceeding made or brought against Contractor or its employees, or in which Contractor or its employees are asked to participate, based upon any materials they prepare, publish or disseminate for Client based upon information provided or approved by Client prior to its dissemination, production or publication, as well as any claim or suit arising out of the nature or use of Client's products or Contractor's relationship with Client, except for losses or expenses that result from Contractor's negligence or willful misconduct or that of its employees.
- Entire Agreement. This Agreement supersedes any and all agreements, either oral or in writing, between the parties hereto with respect to the rendering of services by Contractor for Client and contains all of the covenants and agreements between the parties with respect to the rendering of such services in any manner whatsoever. Each party to this Agreement acknowledges that no representations, inducements, promises, or agreements, orally or otherwise, have been made by any party, or anyone acting on behalf of any parties, which are not embodied herein, and that no other agreement, statement, or promise not contained in this Agreement shall be valid or binding. Any modification of this Agreement will be effective only if it is in writing signed by the party to be charged.
- 5.3 <u>Partial Invalidity.</u> If any provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall nevertheless continue in full force without being impaired or invalidated in any way.
- Arbitration. Any controversy between the parties hereto involving the construction or application of any of the terms, covenants, or conditions of this Agreement will, on the written request of one party served on the other, be submitted to arbitration. The arbitration will comply with and be governed by the provisions of the California Arbitration Act (Sections 1280 through 1294.2 of the California Code of Civil Procedure). The parties will each appoint one person to hear and determine the dispute and if they are unable to agree, then the two persons so chosen will select a third impartial arbitrator whose decision will be final and conclusive on both parties. The cost of arbitration will be borne in such proportions as the arbitrators decide.

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5.5 <u>Governing Law.</u> This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

Amendment to Agreement for ALS Ambulance Services

TOPIC

Staff proposes that the Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District (District) amend the Agreement for ALS Ambulance Services with American Medical Response (AMR) to temporarily provide two (2) additional twelve (12) hour ambulances. The term of this agreement shall commence on June 21, 2021 and shall terminate on December 31, 2021.

BACKGROUND

The District has a contract with AMR to provide six (6) ambulances deployed twelve (12) hours per day, 365 days per year, for a total of 26,280 yearly unit hours. The hours of operation for these units are between 08:00-23:00, and they are staffed at all times with a minimum of one Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) certified in Sacramento County, and one (1) paramedic, or two (2) paramedics, licensed and accredited in Sacramento County. The existing agreement with AMR specifies that at the request of the District, additional unit hours may be added to the standard six (6) ambulance deployment and shall be paid at the standard unit hour rate.

DISCUSSION

The District sought a single contractor to provide emergency and non-emergency ambulances as a supplemental service to our current ambulance and Emergency Medical Services (EMS) system. The contract was structured to allow for surge of additional ALS ambulances into the system during an acute increase in call volume. Further, the contract provides for adding ALS ambulances into the system for longer temporary time intervals if internal staffing levels fluctuate.

For any services provided by AMR on behalf of Metro Fire, the District is responsible for billing the patient or any third-party payor in order to recover the cost of the service.

The Single Role Paramedic Program (SRPP) will experience a temporary shortage of personnel when the 21-1 Fire Academy begins July 06, 2021. There are sixteen (16) members advancing to the fire academy, and their last day in the SRPP is June 30, 2021. SRPP Academy 21-1 netted five (5) recruits, so by June 30th there will be eighteen (18) members in the SRPP ranks. With this number of personnel, the District can staff two (2) SRPP units twenty-four (24) hours per day.

SRPP Academy 21-2 is projected to begin the second week in August, and there are eighteen (18) EMTs and paramedics currently in the background process. Successful recruits will be prepared to count as staffing in mid-September 2021. Thus, the District has a temporary need for additional unit hours to maintain existing coverage levels.

The minimum number of unit hours that will be added to the EMS system to cover the temporary staffing shortage is 2,448 hours. This provides two (2), twelve (12) hour ambulances operating from 06:00-18:00 and 18:00-06:00. While staff anticipates coverage is only needed through September 30th, the agreement's expiration date is December 31, 2021 to provide flexibility to extend if needed.

FISCAL IMPACT

The District agrees to compensate AMR based upon the unit hour cost set forth in the Agreement for Ambulance Services. The table below takes into account the rate increase effective July 01, 2021. The financial impact analysis is attached to this staff report, and the cost difference is well below the expected cost recovery for the time period.

All other terms, conditions, and obligations of the Agreement for Ambulance Services remain in full force and effect. The parties acknowledge and agree that this Amendment is intended to temporarily provide additional unit hours as described herein. This Agreement has been reviewed and approved by Legal Counsel.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the District amend the Agreement for ALS Ambulance Service to provide two (2) additional ambulances each deployed twelve hours per day. The amendment shall cover the period from June 21, 2021 to December 31, 2021.

AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT FOR AMBULANCE SERVICES

This Amendment ("Amendment") to the Agreement for 911 Ambulance Service, Response and Transportation ("Agreement") dated July 1, 2000 by and between the Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District ("DISTRICT") and American Medical Response West ("CONTRACTOR") is made and entered into effective June 21, 2021 by and between the District and Contractor, (collectively, the "Parties")

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the parties executed an Agreement on July 1, 2000 whereby CONTRACTOR agreed to provide 911 Ambulance Service, Response, and Transportation; and,

WHEREAS, the CONTRACTOR agreed to provide six (6) ambulance units, twelve (12) hours per day between the hours of 0800-2300 as described in Paragraph 085(A) of the Agreement; and,

WHEREAS, the DISTRICT needs to temporarily provide for additional ambulance units for different times during a 24-hour period; and,

WHEREAS, the CONTRACTOR desires to provide the additional units on a temporary basis; and,

WHEREAS this Amendment shall not replace any term of the Agreement except as set forth below;

Now, THEREFORE, the Parties Agree as follow:

- 1. VEHICLES CONTRACTOR agrees to provide two (2) additional ambulances each deployed twelve (12) hours per day, 365 days per year. The hours for operation shall be 0600-1800 for one unit, and 1800-0600 for the other unit. Any unit hours incurred in excess of the standard twelve (12) hour per unit deployment due to emergency incidents shall be paid at the standard unit hour rate set forth in the Agreement.
- 2. TERM This Amendment shall be effective upon approval of the District's governing Board and execution of the parties. The Amendment shall cover the period from June 21, 2021 to December 31, 2021. This Amendment can be terminated at any earlier time by the DISTRICT upon 30 days written notice to the CONTRACTOR.
- COMPENSATION TO CONTRACTOR The DISTRICT agrees to compensate CONTRACTOR based upon the unit hour cost set forth in the Agreement.

All other terms, conditions, and obligations of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect. The parties acknowledge and agree that this Amendment is to

temporarily provide additional units and hours as described herein due to staffing shortages of the DISTRICT during the term of this Amendment.

SUMMARY

Staff will be expending funds to purchase Fiduciary Liability Insurance. This coverage will provide claim and legal defense coverage for all Metro Fire benefit plans except CalPERS. The expenditure will be payable to RLI Insurance in the amount of \$18,025.

DISCUSSION

USI Insurance Services provided the District's insurance brokerage services this year and managed the marketing of the District's fiduciary liability insurance. This coverage will serve to protect the fiduciaries of the District including Board members, Deferred Compensation Committee members and management. The Deferred Compensation Plan has assets in excess of \$140 million and an active Deferred Compensation Committee focused on fiduciary compliance.

Many carriers were solicited to provide a quote for Metro Fire's Fiduciary Liability Insurance and all except RLI declined. Arch, Devon Park/USLI, Great American, Hartford, Shyward, Scottsdale (ERisk), and Zurich declined because of class of business. Argo, Awac, CAN, CHUBB, Ironshore, Markel, Nexus, Philly and Travelers all declined as they were unable to provide terms.

RLI is the lowest, most responsive, responsible carrier and is the recommendation of USI Insurance Services to carry the District's fiduciary insurance needs.

FISCAL IMPACT

The fiscal impact is \$18,025. Funds sufficient to meet this obligation are budgeted in the Preliminary Budget for 2021/2022.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Board of Directors authorize the payment of \$18,025 to RLI Insurance for the purchase of Fiduciary Liability Insurance.

SUMMARY

The expenditure will be payable to Safety National Casualty Corporation in the amount of \$499,331.

DISCUSSION

USI Insurance Services provided the District's insurance brokerage services this year and managed the marketing of the District's Excess Workers' Compensation Liability Insurance. This type of coverage provides the District additional insurance coverage in the event of a catastrophic workers' compensation loss that could occur in excess of our self insured retention (the portion the District would pay before the insurance pays). For these guotes, self insured retentions of \$3.0 million, per occurrence, were selected, consistent with limits chosen last year. Several carriers were contacted during marketing. The other companies that were solicited, CHUBB, Star Insurance, Arch and Midwest Employers either declined because they are no longer adding fire risks to their portfolio, no longer write standalone fire districts or they couldn't be competitive with Safety National.

Safety National Casualty Corporation with an SIR of \$3.0 million was chosen as the carrier and is the recommendation of USI Insurance Services to carry the District's Excess Workers' Compensation Insurance needs. Safety's quote which includes statutory limits is the best policy an agency could secure.

FISCAL IMPACT

The fiscal impact is \$499,331. Funds sufficient to meet this obligation are budgeted in the Preliminary Budget for 2021/2022.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Board of Directors authorize the payment not to exceed \$499,331 to Safety National for Excess Workers' Compensation Insurance.

SUMMARY

Staff will be expending funds to purchase aviation liability insurance. The expenditure will be payable to Westchester Fire Insurance Company in the amount of \$108,089 for the aviation policy.

DISCUSSION

USI Insurance Services provided the District's insurance brokerage services this year and managed the marketing of the District's aviation liability insurance. The aviation liability insurance package for the upcoming fiscal year includes coverage for two flying helicopters and two grounded helicopters.

The aviation policy premium has increased from FY 20/21, as the market conditions are dictating higher premiums for all insurance services. We will be insuring two flying helicopters each valued at \$1,500,000 and two grounded helicopters each valued at \$350,000. The flying helicopters carry \$10,000,000 of liability, and the grounded helicopters carry \$1,000,000 of liability.

The insurance requested includes any pilot approved by Metro Fire's Chief Pilot or designee and covers all uses in connection with the operations of Metro Fire including mutual aid agreements Westchester Fire Insurance Company is the carrier recommended by USI to carry the District's aviation liability insurance needs.

FISCAL IMPACT

The fiscal impact is \$108,089. Funds sufficient to meet this obligation are budgeted in the Preliminary Budget for FY 2021/2022.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Board of Directors authorize the payment of \$108,089 to Westchester Fire Insurance Company for the purchase of Aviation Liability Insurance.
