Subject: Award Contracts for Fire & Life Safety Building Plan Review Services

TOPIC

Staff proposes the Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District Board of Directors award non-exclusive contracts for Fire & Life Safety Building Plan Review Services to Interwest Consulting Group, Inc. and Bureau Veritas North America, Inc.

BACKGROUND

Since July of 2003, the Community Risk Reduction Division (CRRD) has been augmenting its plan review staff with the use of an independent plan review services contractor. Approximately 4,500 commercial and residential plans are reviewed by CRRD each year, and due to economic improvements in recent years, CRRD's plan review workload has been increasing.

Over the last five (5) fiscal years, 31.6% of plan reviews were completed by an independent plan review services contractor. The reasons for this are multifactorial including specialized plan review needs and transient staffing deficiencies related to the pandemic or Family & Medical Leave Act requests. While the staffing impacts of COVID-19 are greatly reduced, recent retirements, resignations, and promotions have left CRRD short three (3) fire inspectors. Although hiring is in process, it is anticipated that new inspectors will not come on board for at least another three (3) months. Hence, the continuing need for support from an outside plan review services contractor.

The District's goal is to complete all initial plan reviews within ten (10) business days from the date of submission. To continue to meet our service delivery goal of providing our community with expedient and quality plan reviews, the District is seeking a non-exclusive contract with interested and qualified persons and/or firms to provide plan review services on an as-needed basis for CRRD.

DISCUSSION

A Request for Proposals (RFP 22-02) for CRRD Building Plan Review Services was issued on June 24, 2022. Per the RFP, the selected proposer shall provide plan review services as requested by the District for commercial and residential projects within the District's boundaries. All reviews must be in compliance with current local, state, and federal codes adopted by the District.

Six (6) proposers responded to the RFP. All proposers were deemed responsive. The proposers are listed in alphabetical order below:

Bureau Veritas North America, Inc CSG Consultants, Inc. FP&C Consultants Interwest Consulting Group, Inc West Coast Consultants, Inc. (WC3) 4Leaf Inc.

The proposals were independently reviewed by an evaluation committee comprised of CRRD and Economic Development staff. Each proposal was scored to determine its responsiveness to the District's requirements and demonstrated ability to meet the District's needs, anticipated value brought to the District, and conformance to submittal requirements. Evaluation was based upon the following criteria identified in the RFP:

The evaluation committee met with the Purchasing Division to discuss their scores on August 15, 2022. Based upon the evaluators' final ranking, it is the intent of the District to award three year, non-exclusive contracts to the two highest scoring proposers; Interwest Consulting Group, Inc. and Bureau Veritas North America Inc. These two proposers were found to be to the most responsive and responsible proposers who demonstrated the best value for the District Each contract may be

These two proposers were found to be to the most responsive and responsible proposers who demonstrated the best value for the District Each contract may be extended for up to two additional 12 month periods beyond the primary contract period.

FISCAL IMPACT

The District reviews approximately 4,500 commercial and residential plans on an annual basis, and a portion of these plans will need to be sent for outside review depending on volume and staffing availability. The costs for outside plan review services are offset by the fees assessed by the District for plan review and inspection services (cost recovery). The CRRD Fee Schedules for Construction and Fire Systems (Attachment A) detail the current fees assessed by the District for these services. An updated fee study is underway that will take into account increased hourly rates for outsourced plan review services to ensure adequate cost recovery. The District budgeted \$70,000 to outsource plan review services in FY 22/23.

RECOMMENDATION

SUBJECT: Adoption of a Reimbursement Resolution – Tax-Exempt Debt

TOPIC

Staff recommends adoption of the attached reimbursement resolution to reimburse the District for funds that have been or may be expended prior to issuing tax-exempt debt. The recommended action is in anticipation of the District entering into a capital lease transaction to fund the purchase of budgeted capital expenditures.

DISCUSSION

In order to legally reimburse expenditures made prior to the issuance of tax-exempt debt, a reimbursement resolution must be in place pursuant to Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2. Adoption of a reimbursement resolution does not bind the District to issuing future debt. Instead, a reimbursement resolution allows the District to use its own funds for capital expenditures and later repay itself from the financing proceeds.

Purchases made after the reimbursement resolution adoption and those made no more than 60 days prior to adoption are eligible for reimbursement. Staff anticipates the recommendation to finance not more than \$8,000,000 of capital purchases in accordance with the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) and the FY2022-23 Final Budget. The capital purchases include medics, engines, copter conversion, and other vehicles and equipment.

FISCAL IMPACT

Adoption of the resolution will allow reimbursement of qualified District expenditures up to \$8,000,000. Purchases that are projected to be delivered in FY 2022-23 have been included in the District's FY 2022/23 Final Budget.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends adoption of the attached reimbursement resolution.

SECTION 1. Compliance with Treasury Regulations

This declaration is made solely for purposes of establishing compliance with requirements of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. This declaration does not bind the District to make any Capital Asset expenditure or incur any indebtedness.

TOPIC

Award a contract for specialized legal services to Best, Best and Krieger, LLP 500 Capital Mall, Suite 1700, Sacramento, CA, 95814.

DISCUSSION

The Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District is in final preparation to enter the code adoption process for local amendments to the 2022 California Fire Code. The Community Risk Reduction Division has a need to contract for specialized legal services for evaluation of the fire code amendments.

Under the provisions of Section 18941.5 of the Health and Safety Code, local amendments are based on climatic, topographical and geological conditions. While it is clearly understood that the adoption of such amendments may not prevent the incidence of fire, the implementation of these various amendments to the code attempt to reduce the severity and potential loss of life, property and protection of the environment.

The California Fire Code is updated on a triennial cycle and released on July 01 to allow for local agencies to begin the review and adoption process by January 01 of the year following the release. The 2022 California Fire Code will be effective January 01, 2023. Metro Fire has participated in the Sacramento Regional Fire Prevention Officer Association meetings with a continual discussion regarding local amendments to the 2022 Fire Code and the adoption process.

The Community Risk Reduction Division met with local Fire Marshals and surrounding fire agencies including Sacramento City Fire, Folsom Fire, and Cosumnes Fire District in an effort to discuss local/regional amendments to the 2022 California Fire Code and the appropriate adoption process. Further communication and outreach included the City of Citrus Heights, City of Rancho Cordova and the Sacramento County Building Department regarding the local amendment adoption process.

During our research and outreach phase of the process, it was determined there is a need to consult with a specialized legal office for services to evaluate Metro Fire's local amendments to the 2022 California Fire Code as it relates to implementation, compliance and regulation.

The Law firm of Best, Best and Krieger, LLP is uniquely qualified among firms in the greater Sacramento region to advise and evaluate the legality and authority of the amendments to the 2022 California Fire Code, however they are not on the list of firms recently authorized in Board Resolution 2022-007 (Extension of a Multiple Award Schedule for Legal Services). Best, Best and Krieger currently serves forty-three jurisdictions in regards to the Fire and Building Code adoption process, and this firm assisted the District with the 2016 California Fire Code update.

FISCAL IMPACT

The projected costs to contract with Best, Best and Krieger, LLP are estimated to not exceed \$3,000 and were budgeted for in FY22/23.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the board authorize a single source contract to hire the law firm of Best, Best and Krieger, LLP to provide legal services as specified above.

Schedule

TOPIC

A resolution has been prepared establishing an appropriation (Gann) limit for Fiscal Year 2022/23 in the amount of \$421,347,811. Staff recommends approval of the proposed resolution.

SUMMARY

State law requires that every governmental entity in California prepare calculations each fiscal year of the entity's maximum allowed appropriations. The formula used to make these calculations involves adjusting the entity's previous "Gann limit" by incorporating changes to population and per capita income. These factors are provided by the State Department of Finance. A governmental entity is not permitted to spend more than its calculated Gann limit.

DISCUSSION

Based upon staff calculations, the District's Gann limit for FY 2022/23 is \$421,347,811 which represents an increase of \$27,122,688 when compared to the FY 2021/22 Gann limit of \$394,225,123. This increase is due to a 7.55% increase in per capita income statewide slightly offset by 0.63% average decrease in the population of the cities and unincorporated area within the District. Calculation details can be found in the attached schedule.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact since the District's FY 2022/23 proposed operating budget subject to the limit is well below the \$421,347,811 set by the Gann limit.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the resolution establishing an appropriation (Gann) limit for Fiscal Year 2022/23 be approved.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE SACRAMENTO METROPOLITAN FIRE DISTRICT PROCLAIMING A LOCAL EMERGENCY, RE-RATIFYING THE PROCLAMATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY BY GOVERNOR GAVIN NEWSOM MARCH 4, 2020, AND AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS OF THE LEGISLATIVE BODIES OF THE SACRAMENTO METROPOLITAN FIRE DISTRICT FOR THE PERIOD OF SEPTEMBER 8, 2022 – OCTOBER 7, 2022 PURSUANT TO BROWN ACT PROVISIONS.

WHEREAS, the Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District is committed to preserving and nurturing public access and participation in meetings of the Board of Directors; and

WHEREAS, all meetings of the Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District's legislative bodies are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code 54950 – 54963), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and watch the District's legislative bodies conduct their business; and

WHEREAS, the Brown Act, Government Code section 54953(e), makes provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions; and

WHEREAS, a required condition is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558; and

WHEREAS, a proclamation is made when there is an actual incident, threat of disaster, or extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the jurisdictions that are within the District's boundaries, caused by natural, technological, or human-caused disasters; and

WHEREAS, it is further required that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or, the legislative body meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, meeting in person would present imminent risk to health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors does hereby find that conditions causing imminent risk to attendees has caused, and will continue to cause, conditions of peril to the safety of persons within the District that are likely to be beyond the control of services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the District, and desires to proclaim a local emergency and ratify the proclamation of state of emergency by the Governor of the State of California; and

WHEREAS, as a consequence of the local emergency, the Board of Directors does hereby find that the legislative bodies of the Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District shall conduct their meetings without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Government Code section 54953, as authorized by subdivision (e) of section 54953, and that such legislative bodies shall comply with the requirements to provide the public with access to the meetings as prescribed in paragraph (2) of subdivision (e) of section 54953; and

WHEREAS, all meetings will be held in a virtual manner where the public may access them via the virtual platform with all login information provided on each board meeting agenda.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE SACRAMENTO METROPOLITAN FIRE DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Recitals. The Recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.

Section 2. <u>Proclamation of Local Emergency</u>. The Board hereby proclaims that a local emergency now exists throughout the District, and meeting in person would present imminent risk.

Section 3. <u>Ratification of Governor's Proclamation of a State of Emergency</u>. The Board hereby re-ratifies the Governor of the State of California's Proclamation of State of Emergency, effective as of its issuance date of March 4, 2020.

Section 4. Remote Teleconference Meetings. The staff and legislative bodies of the Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Resolution including, conducting open and public meetings in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Brown Act.

Section 5. <u>Effective Date of Resolution</u>. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall be effective until the earlier of (i) October 7, 2022, or such time the Board of Directors adopts a subsequent resolution in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e)(3) to extend the time during which the legislative bodies of the Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District may continue to teleconference without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of section 54953.

TOPIC

Staff seeks the Board of Directors' approval to enter into agreement to continue Metro Fire's participation in the Sacramento Regional Incident Management Team.

SUMMARY

In 2010, the Sacramento Regional Incident Management Team (SRIMT) was formed as a concept of the Regional Operations Chiefs to answer the growing need for a method of managing larger scale emergencies in the Sacramento Region. The team started with the participation of Folsom Fire Department, Sacramento Fire Department, Cosumnes Fire Department, Metro Fire, and Cal Fire Amador-Eldorado Unit. Since then, the team has grown in both capabilities and member agencies, with the addition of the Sacramento Police Department, Sacramento County Sheriff's Department, and CAL FIRE Nevada-Yuba-Placer Unit.

DISCUSSION

Since its creation, the SRIMT has activated over 30 times to manage emergencies in our region. These emergencies have included large scale vegetation fires, potential failures of Folsom Dam, and widespread civil unrest. The team has been successful in its deployments and management of these incidents. The purpose of the SRIMT is to support the agency having jurisdiction of the incident; in none of these cases has the team assumed responsibility for the emergency or response.

The SRIMT is set up with reciprocal services as its base, in which any member agency can request the services of the team. Member agencies support their employees that are team members in the response. To date, each member agency of the SRIMT has requested activation for a response and never received a bill for services. The team maintains a Finance Section that seeks funding sources such as Fire Management Assistance Grant monies to further offset expense.

FISCAL IMPACT

The agreement presents the same fiscal impact to Metro Fire that has existed since the inception of the SRIMT. When team members are deployed, their spots are backfilled

by personnel on overtime. Over the last two years, Metro Fire SRIMT members have been deployed for an average of 263 hours, which equates to ~\$16,182 per year. Some deployments were so large that they were eligible under the California Fire Assistance Agreement, which provides retroactive reimbursement to the time of dispatch.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Board of Directors authorize Fire Chief Harms to sign the Memorandum of Agreement for Participation in the Sacramento Regional Incident Management Team.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN SACRAMENTO CITY FIRE DEPARTMENT, SACRAMENTO METROPOLITAN FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT, SACRAMENTO SHERIFF'S OFFICE, SACRAMENTO POLICE DEPARTMENT, FOLSOM CITY FIRE DEPARTMENT, COSUMNES FIRE DEPARTMENT, CAL FIRE AMADOR-EL DORADO UNIT, AND CAL FIRE NEVADA YUBA PLACER UNIT FOR PARTICIPATION IN THE SACRAMENTO REGIONAL INCIDENT MANAGEMENT TEAM

THIS MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT (MOA) is entered into on _______, 2022 by and between the SACRAMENTO CITY FIRE DEPARTMENT, SACRAMENTO METROPOLITAN FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT, SACRAMENTO SHERIFF'S OFFICE, SACRAMENTO CITY POLICE DEPARTMENT, COSUMNES FIRE DEPARTMENT, FOLSOM CITY FIRE DEPARTMENT, CAL FIRE AMADOR-EL DORADO UNIT, AND THE CAL FIRE NEVADA YUBA PLACER UNIT. All listed agencies may be collectively referred to as "Parties" or in the singular as "Party" as the context requires.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Sacramento Regional Incident Management Team (SRIMT), herein referred to as the Team, exists to provide qualified personnel organized to support emergency response, recovery efforts, and planned event operations. The Team provides the framework necessary to establish an incident command or unified command system as required by the Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS) and National Incident Management System (NIMS). The Team is administered at the regional level by the Team Executive Committee in compliance with this MOA.

WHEREAS, each signatory agency to this MOA ("Participant") shall participate in the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall consist of an Agency Administrator for each Participant. The Executive Committee's primary purpose is to provide policy level oversight to the Team.

WHEREAS, any Participant may request the Team when there is a need for assistance in the command and/or general staff functions. Team activation requests shall be considered by the Executive Committee on a case-by-case basis. The requesting agency will maintain jurisdictional responsibility of the incident unless a Delegation of Authority has been fully executed.

WHEREAS, the Team may be used for incidents that extend into a second operational period that require a planning cycle, incident action plan, and operational briefing.

WHEREAS, the Team may be used for incidents that may exceed the ability of the Authority Having Jurisdiction (AHJ) to adequately provide incident command and/or support functions due to the size, scope, and/or complexity of an incident or event.

WHEREAS, the Team may be used for incidents involving terrorism, civil unrest

or other criminal activity.

WHEREAS, the Team may be used for incidents that pose unique tactical and/or incident management requirements.

WHEREAS, the Team may be used for special and planned events that may require the coordination of multiple agencies and organizations or pose unique or significant response challenges.

NOW, THEREFORE, IN CONSIDERATION OF MUTUAL PROMISES CONTAINED HEREIN, THE PARTIES AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this MOA is to establish mutually agreeable terms for the development, administration and utilization of the Team.

II. TERMS OF THE AGREEMENT

This MOA shall be deemed executed when it has been signed by all Participants and shall end only upon termination under the terms set forth in Sections IX and XI of this agreement.

III. PARTICIPANTS

Participants include the SACRAMENTO CITY FIRE DEPARTMENT, SACRAMENTO METROPOLITAN FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT, SACRAMENTO SHERIFF'S OFFICE, SACRAMENTO CITY POLICE DEPARTMENT, COSUMNES FIRE DEPARTMENT, FOLSOM CITY FIRE DEPARTMENT, CAL FIRE AMADOR-EL DORADO UNIT, AND THE CAL FIRE NEVADA YUBA PLACER UNIT.

IV. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE RESPONSIBLITY

The responsibility for oversight of the policies related to the performance of the Team shall be the responsibility of the Executive Committee. Each Participant shall designate one person from that agency to be a member of the committee. The committee shall establish rules related to the procedure for the time of meetings, conduct of meetings, the location of meetings and any other related matters as agreed to by the Committee.

V. BUDGET

No financial compensation shall be provided or received by any Participant for participation in the Team, unless where reimbursement is available for Participants through state or federal cost recovery plans.

VI. PARTY RESPONSIBILITIES

A. Agency participation on the Team is voluntary. The costs associated with the deployment of a Participant's personnel for Team training, meetings, and

- incident response are the responsibility of that Participant's agency.
- B. Team members must function in the course of employment and be covered by Workers' Compensation insurance through their Participant's agency.
- C. All Team members shall perform in a safe, efficient, and professional manner at all times when they are representing the Team. All Team members agree to obey and follow all policies and procedures outlined in the Team manual (Appendix I), the terms of which are incorporated herein and made a part of this MOA. Failure to do so may result in release from the incident and/or removal from the Team.

VII. TERMINATION

Any Participant may terminate their participation in this MOA at any time upon serving a 30-day written notice to the Executive Committee. The MOA shall remain in effect for all other Participants.

VIII. NOTICE

Except as otherwise stated herein, any notice, demand, request, consent of approval that any Participant hereto may or is required to give to the other, pursuant to this MOA shall be in writing and shall be either personally delivered or sent by mail addressed as follows:

IX. <u>TERMINATION FOR BREACH</u>

Should any Participant, either individually or collectively, fail to substantially perform its obligations in accordance with this MOA, upon approval of the Executive Committee, a written notice of breach and requirement to cure may be served upon the breaching Participant by the Executive Committee. The notice shall advise of the nature of the breach and provide a reasonable opportunity to cure. Such opportunity shall provide a minimum of 3 days following the date of service in which to cure the default, or, if the default is of such a nature that it cannot be reasonably cured within 3 days, to provide a plan for curing and to commence the cure and diligently prosecute it to completion. If the breaching Participant fails to cure within the period specified, the Executive Committee may serve upon the breaching Participant written notice of termination of that Participant from this MOA specifying the reasons therefor, and the date of termination which shall not be sooner than 2 days following the date the notice is served.

X. INDEMNIFICATION

To the extent permitted by law, each Participant hereto does hereby assume liability for, and agrees to defend, indemnify, protect, save and keep harmless the other Participant(s) and their directors, officers, agents, employees and its successors and assigns from and against any and all liabilities, obligations, losses, damages, penalties, fines, claims, actions, suits, costs and expenses and disbursements (including legal fees and expenses) of any kind and nature imposed in, asserted against, incurred or suffered by such indemnified Participant(s) or their directors, officers or employees or its successors and assigns by reason of damage, loss or injury (including death) of any kind or nature whatsoever to persons or property caused by or in any way relating to or arising out of:

- i) Any negligent or wrongful act or action, or any neglect, omission, or failure to act when under a duty to act, or any willful misconduct, on the part of the indemnifying Participant or any of its directors, officers, agents, contractors, or employees in its or their performance hereunder arising out of the performance of this MOA.
- ii) Violation by the indemnifying Participant or any of its directors, officers, agents, contractors, or employees of any applicable federal, state or local laws/ordinances and any and all lawful orders, rules and regulations issued by any authority with jurisdiction over this MOA.

- iii) In the event that 2 or more Participants are responsible for any part of any liability hereunder, liability therefor shall be shared between those Participants according to the principles of comparative fault.
- iv) Each Participant shall notify the other Participant(s) of any claims, administrative actions, or legal actions with respect to any of the matters described in this indemnification provision. The Participants shall cooperate in the defense of such actions brought by others with respect to the matters covered in this indemnity.
- v) This indemnity shall not be limited by the types and amounts of insurance, self-insurance or pooled liability contracts or self-insurance maintained by any Participant to this MOA.
- vi) Nothing in this Indemnity shall be construed to create any duty to, any standard of care with reference to, or any liability or obligation, contractual or otherwise, to any third party.
- vii) The indemnity in this section shall survive the termination or expiration of the MOA.

XI. INSURANCE OR SELF INSURANCE

Each Participant, at its sole cost and expense, shall carry insurance, or be a member of a pooled liability contract – or self-insure – its activities in connection with this MOA, and obtain, keep in force, and maintain, such coverage insurance or equivalent programs of self-insurance, for general liability, workers compensation, property, professional liability, and business automobile liability adequate to cover its potential liabilities hereunder. Each Participant agrees to provide the others thirty (30) days' advance written notice of any cancellation, termination or lapse of any of the insurance or self-insurance coverage. Failure to maintain insurance as required in this MOA is a material breach of contract and may be grounds for termination of the breaching Participant from the MOA.

XII. RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE PARTIES

Nothing herein shall be construed to either create, or does any other Participant intend to create by the terms hereof, any contractual or other relationship, whether expressed or implied, of joint power, joint venture, partner, principal-agent, independent contractor, or master-servant.

XIII. <u>ASSIGNMENT - SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS</u>

No Participant may not assign this MOA in whole or in part, nor any right, duty, or obligation provided herein, without the express written consent of the Executive Committee. The rights and liabilities set forth herein shall inure to the benefit and bind successors and assigns of the Participants to this MOA but shall not inure to the benefit of any third party or person.

XIV. GOVERNING LAW

The interpretation and enforcement of the MOA shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. Venue for any action filed by any Participant shall be in the Superior Court for the County of Sacramento.

XV. INTERPRETATION

This MOA shall be deemed to have been prepared equally by all of the Participants, and the MOA and its individual provisions shall not be construed or interpreted more favorably for one Participant on the basis that the other Participant prepared it.

XVI. DISPUTES

In the event of any dispute arising out of or relating to this MOA, the Participants shall attempt, in good faith, to promptly and mutually resolve the dispute mutually between the respective Participants. If the dispute involves 3 or more Participants, the dispute shall be submitted to the Executive Committee. Pending resolution of any such dispute the Participants shall continue without delay to carry out all its responsibilities under this MOA unless the MOA is otherwise terminated, or a disputing Participant is terminated from the MOA, in accordance with the Termination provisions herein. Nothing in this MOA or provision shall constitute a waiver of any of the government claim filing requirements set forth in Title 1, Division 3.6, of the California Government Code or as otherwise set forth in local, state and federal law.

XVII. DUPLICATE COUNTERPARTS

This MOA may be executed in duplicate counterparts, with copies provided to all Participants hereto. The MOA shall be deemed executed when it has been signed by all Participants.

XVIII. AUTHORITY TO EXECUTE

Each person executing this MOA represents and warrants that he or she is duly authorized and has legal authority to execute and deliver this MOA for or on behalf of their Participant agency to this MOA. Each Participant represents and warrants to the other Participants that the execution and delivery of the MOA and the performance of such Participant's obligations hereunder have been duly authorized.
